<u>Chippie</u>

Chaplain Ken Carter posted his reflections on Max Lucado's book, "In The Eye Of The Storm" on Facebook. He gave me permission to print his post here.

"The book is a story about a parakeet named Chippie. Chippie the parakeet never saw it coming. One second he was peacefully perched in his cage, and the next he was sucked in, washed up and blown over.
