Church signs seen recently: Building closed – Church at work. Worship suspended – ministry continues. No worship here, but God makes house calls. As we continue to struggle to come to terms with whatever the new normal will be when the pandemic is finally under control, it is good to be reminded that there are still many things going on, many opportunities to help, much to celebrate right now, and much to look forward to. Once again, this newsletter is a reminder of all that is going on in New St. James, and notice of good things about to happen.

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Important announcement from the Search Committee!

The Work of the Search Committee has continued throughout the challenging COVID-19 Pandemic period. We are happy to report that on September 1, 2020, the Session of New St. James received a report from the Committee recommending a candidate to be invited to Preach for the Call.

The Session has approved the Committee recommendation and a candidate has been invited to Preach for the Call at New St. James on Sunday, September 27, 2020. Because the Sanctuary has not yet been opened for public worship, the service will be preached only to the Session in the Sanctuary, but the service will be both

livestreamed and recorded for others to view online. A virtual Congregational Meeting will be held on the Sunday afternoon subsequent to the service to consider extending a Call to the Minister (only professing Members may vote on the Call). Opportunities will also be provided to meet by video conference with the candidate in the week preceding Preaching for the Call. If the Call is supported by the Congregation, arrangements will be made for your District Elder to make telephone contact with you to determine if you wish to support the Call. Please check on the Church website for updates on this process.

From the Clerk of Session

Greetings from the Clerk of Session as we draw toward the end of Summer and look toward the Autumn. As we continue to be in a period of physical distancing and masking orders, we are making efforts to reduce the community spread of the COVID-19 virus. During this time, we hope that you are staying safe and healthy and also connected to others in the Congregation.

As you know, the Province has allowed Churches to open their buildings for public worship with a number of limitations and restrictions on worship activities. While some churches have opened their buildings, many other churches (including New St. James) have taken a cautionary approach and are waiting until after Labour Day to reassess the situation and review the experience of others before making any decisions. In this regard, the New St. James COVID-19 Response Team will be considering the matter of public worship after Labour Day.

In the interim, our weekly worship services, prayers, sermons and reflections from Rev. Mark McLennan are

posted on the New St. James website www.newstjames.ca, and Rev. McLennan and Torin Chiles (with the assistance of Nawton and Tennyson Chiles) have been livestreaming worship services from the Sanctuary on Sunday mornings.

The Congregational leaders (Moderator, Rev. Dr. Andrew Fullerton, Clerk of Session, Chair of the Board of Managers, Human Resources Convenor, Treasurer and other Committee Convenors as necessary plus regular contact with staff) continue to meet to manage the financial affairs of the Church and address other

matters as they arise.

On-site Church progra

On-site Church program activities continue to be suspended and the building remains closed to non-staff and non-essential Church workers as well as outside users of our facilities, to protect our staff. Appointments will need to be made in advance to meet with Rev. McLennan and Church staff, and we will be following protective public health measures and increased sanitizing of the premises for any visitors. Our new website continues to be working well and is helpful with our communications curing the COVID-19 period.

From the Music Director

I last wrote an article for this newsletter just after this past Easter. I began by saying it was an Easter like no Easter any of us has ever had before. I remember playing the organ and singing a little at 10:30 am, Sunday March 15 when the first Sunday service was cancelled. I came merely because the thought of a quiet sanctuary on a Sunday morning was inconceivable to me and I came to reach out and offer something of comfort. That was the first Sunday Facebook Live 'service', with just me and my iPad propped in the corner of the organ console.

The next Sunday brought a full lockdown for us all and what was inconceivable to me the week before was the new reality. As that next Sunday approached Lesley and a Nawton and I thought that we might be able to offer a Devotional Service of sorts that would reach out to our NSJ family and perhaps even reach out to a wider community. We started streaming our little Devotional Services from our living room using prayers and readings sent by Rev. Mark McLennan

and hymns selected from the two hymn books I had at home - the rest of my music was inaccessible at the church and at the university. We never imagined that we would continue these services each week faithfully through the spring and even into the summer, but it seemed to take on a spirit of its own. We started small with only a few people joining our Facebook Live stream (I think we had under 30 for the first one) and then a few more watching the post afterwards, but the word spread, and more and more people started joining us each Sunday. People started 'sharing' it and 'liking' it until we started getting a couple hundred people joining us for this Service each Sunday.

These services have evolved now to be a Facebook Live Stream from our beautiful Sanctuary with Mark preaching in the pulpit, Nawton reading the Scriptures, and me playing our magnificent Casavant organ and singing the hymns. We're keeping the bubble small and the logistics simple for now, so my son Tennyson is our 'cameraman' sitting in

the soprano section of the choir pews and merely swiveling and angling my iPad on a music stand to move between the three of us in the sanctuary. With the return to the sanctuary and to Mark's live sermon each week, we are astounded at the number of people from within our congregation and from around the world that are now joining us both in real time as we offer the service live and watching after once the service is posted on Facebook – the last time I checked the first of these services from the sanctuary had been accessed by over 700 souls!

As the service begins each Sunday, streaming live on my Facebook page, Nawton links it to the homepage of the newly revamped NSJ Website. If you have not yet participated either in real time or after the service is posted, I invite you to do so from the Facebook window on the church's homepage www.newstjames.ca. I think what makes these services authentic is that they are 'live' and that keeps them 'in the moment' and 'real' in a way that epitomizes worship as both a personal and a collective act. We have tried to keep the logistics simple, partly of necessity, but also because the simplicity and slightly spontaneous feeling

contributes to the perception of being there, in the moment as a participant, a contributor – NOT as a mere spectator of more screen content in the very video age of COVID-19.

I am sure that what we are doing now will continue to evolve and we appreciate your suggestions and feedback week by week. We are evolving in terms of equipment used and in terms of delivery. As the public health situation unfolds this Fall, we hope to be able to evolve our Services to suit the needs of our congregation and to respond to the public health directives that keep us all safe; this is a dynamic balance.

Church life has been such a strange experience this year. Through it all though, I remain hopeful! I could not have imagined back in February what worship would be like for us as a church family by mid March. I could not have imagined back in April what we have evolved to for worship now in August. I know that there will be vicissitudes to endure through this coming Fall and yet, I'm learning to take that long perspective of our mission and message that kindles my hope and keeps me resilient and keeps me reaching out!

Mission and Social Action

Despite the lack of face-to-face meetings since mid-March, the Committee has kept in touch with e-mails and phone calls. Thus, donations to various agencies have been on-going.

Following an article in the London Free Press where "The Unity Project Fighting against homelessness in London" made a plea for donations, \$500 was sent to that agency. The Committee has supported the

Unity Project for years not only with money but with clothes and food gathered during our "Back to Basics" and "White Gift Sunday" projects.

An e-mail from the Canadian Foodgrains Bank describing how that agency was helping around the world during COVID-19 prompted a motion to donate \$500. This was agreed to by Committee members.

We were not able to sponsor any children to attend Camp Kintail this summer because all overnight camping was halted. Hopefully, things will be back to 'normal' in the summer of 2021 and we'll be able to run that sponsorship again. In the meantime, the Committee has sent \$2,000 to the camp to help off-set the daily costs of maintaining the grounds and cabins. Another \$1,000 will be sent in the Fall.

Mission Services of London also received \$500 to assist in the efforts to help the homeless.

PWS&D sent an e-mail requesting funds to assist with the "Lebanon crisis". The Committee voted to send \$500. The Canadian Government will match our funds 1-1.

With back-to-school plans underway, the Committee assisted with STAPLES' "Start to Smart" project of providing filled

backpacks for kids in need. \$500 was donated.

A phone call to "My Sister's Place" indicate a need for DEPENDS for both men and women in small sizes as well as shampoo, toothbrushes, toothpaste, and razor blades. (MSP was also serving men because the "William Street Coffee House" was temporarily closed due to COVID-19.) On delivery day, I first stopped at NSJ where Mark helped me load up the socks and underwear collected prior to COVID-19. When all these items were delivered you'd think they had received a million bucks yet the total cost was less than \$120! They were so appreciative of these "basic" needs that it reinforced the day's reading from Our Daily Bread - Luke 6: 32-38 - "Give, and it will be given to you". The prayer for the day was "Gracious Father, help me to give generously to others because You've been so generous to me. Amen."

Northern Hospitality

One thing that has not changed during this COVID-19 pandemic is the need to feed and care for our less fortunate.

Our Northern Hospitality team will host five meals starting September 21 until December 21 of this year. We will prepare the brown bag meals in our New St. James kitchen but they will still be served in a take out style from St. Michael's Roman Catholic Church. We expect there will be a higher number of attendees than this past spring because the Salvation Army is serving just two hot meals a week rather than their previous seven days a week.

The pandemic has kept me busy with hugs requested. Many requests came in for people who were isolated and needed a hug since they were missing their regular hugs. I provided over 280 Hugs for VON's in Ontario and Nova Scotia. These hugs went to Assisted Living/Adult Day clients, Hospice clients, Children's Bereavement clients, families and clients at Sakura House Hospice in Woodstock and many more. I also was honoured to

be asked to send 14 Hugs to the children and grandchild of two VON employees who were shot on duty during the mass shooting in Nova Scotia. One even for the unborn child (one of the hardest I have made). Plus I have done many front porch deliveries to many including some of you who I hope are reading this today.

Covenant House Toronto

This year has certainly been different than most. Instead of going about our daily fast paced lives, our world came to a complete halt back in March. Little did we know that our lives were going to change forever. Our faith was now being tested in new ways and we found ourselves praying a little more than usual. The concern of our families' well-being was a priority and staying sane was the ultimate mission. Little did we realize, there was always someone experiencing circumstances worse than our own.

As you may recall, this was my first year with The Covenant House Toronto. Back in March, I spoke to the church community about the organization. Topics included homeless youth, human trafficking, mental health etc. The church community came together to enlighten one another about this organization. I was blessed to learn from members of the congregation activities provided by Covenant House that I did not know about. Being the first year, one is bound to learn and learn some more. My heart was warmed to see all of the passion and help for not only this organization, but on this topic alone.

For those who were not able to come to the presentation, here are a few statistics for you regarding our homeless youth and trafficking here in Canada:

i. According to The Covenant House Toronto, 300 youth walk through the doors daily needing assistance.

- ii. Most youth who end up on the streets have either been kicked out of the house, suffer from mental health issues or do not feel safe at home.
- iii. 94% of trafficking cases identified in Canada have occurred within its own borders.
- iv. Human trafficking is the #1 leading crime surpassing even the drug trafficking market.

Due to the circumstances of COVID-19, the "Sleep Out" event was held online in June. We slept at home either in our backyard or on our balcony. The experience was very new to me. While sleeping outside I was in a constant "flight or fight" mode. Imagine experiencing that every day while on the streets, feeling unsafe and not having a place to call home. Simply unimaginable!

On a positive note, The Covenant House Toronto raised over \$560,000 for our homeless youth. It was such a successful event, even with the unique changes this year.

I personally wanted to thank everyone for their help and support. I feel very blessed that I was introduced to this organization and that I was able to enlighten the New St. James community. Homeless youth and trafficking are hard topics for anyone to hear, but it is real and happening right now! We need to be strong, educate one another and continue to shine God's light on those who need our help.

Financial Update as of July 31, 2020

Half ways through the summer and New St. James continues to persevere financially. Although our givings are well short of the previous year, our expenses are less, as well. We have also benefited from the Canadian Emergency Wage Subsidy (CEWS) program. Below is a summary of some of the more significant financial indicators as compared to the end of July 2019:

Congregational Support - 30.8% lower than last year

- iv. Introduction of junior primary school besides our existing pre-school; Std 1- 4.
- v. Recruit hardworking and experienced nannies and teachers.
- vi. Procured two buckets for the learners to wash hands when entering the school campus; one at the gate and the other within the campus to avoid COVID-19.

Opportunities

Timvane Organisation has a number of opportunities that can easily be achieved if and only if it is fully supported and here are just some.

- It has a capacity to increase its enrolment if it may have enough resources both financial and materials.
- ii. It has also an opportunity to reach out to many vulnerable children especially those with albinism for their education, security, health and other materials.
- iii. This Organisation can as well develop a centre for the needy youths to access some skills like Computer skills.

Challenges

Apart from the said successes, it is also encountering different challenges which are as well affecting its daily operations to accomplish it objective and here are some of them.

- i. Inadequate space and resources for its smooth operation.
- ii. Lack of recreational materials like football and netball for in and out games.
- iii. Closure of schools due to COVID-19 pandemic that has greatly affected our operations for three months.

Appreciation

Both learners and their teachers as well as the committee members are not affected with this pandemic.

Strategic Plan

i. For the sustainability of thisOrganisation, our plan is to get a land for

An urgent request for help

Note from the publisher: the letter below comes from Emma Klotz, daughter of Andy and Lyn Thompson.

Hello,

First, allow me to introduce myself: my name is Emma Klotz. I'm a single Mum of two boys. I live in London, Ontario. Both of my kidneys have failed; therefore I undergo hemodialysis treatments at University Hospital, and I have been for four years. Dialysis is a treatment, not a cure, and I require this regimen to stay alive. I have to go into the hospital three times per week for four hours per session. Fifteen-gauge needles are inserted into my arm and my blood is drawn out, cleaned in a machine, and put back into my body. Please note that a healthy person's kidneys work 24 hours a day and 7 days a week performing this mandatory task. I only receive 4 hours of treatment 3 times per week to perform the same function. It is a hard process to endure both physically and psychologically. The only hope I have of living a full, uninterrupted, and healthy life is to receive a kidney transplant. Sadly, in my case, there is an issue: I am what the transplant team calls a "highly-sensitized" potential recipient. Without going into too much medical jargon, this simply means the following:

Highly sensitized patients are people who critically need an organ transplant, but because their immune system is sensitized, very few available donors can provide a match.

Immune system sensitization may occur from blood transfusions, previous transplants or pregnancies, which is why many highly-sensitized patients are women.

Highly sensitized patients wait much longer on average for a kidney transplant and have a greater chance of becoming more ill or dying while they wait.

I am writing this letter to appeal to anyone out there who may be willing to consider donating a kidney to me. I am just asking for consideration and nothing more at this point because the process is long. As an aside, I must let you know that a healthy person can live a normal life with one kidney. I fully understand your apprehension to even consider this choice. But, please think about it.

Finally, I beg you to please share this letter on all of your social media platforms. It only takes two or three clicks, and you could aid in the process of saving my life.

Website Performance

Think ahead - be prepared!

Any number of things - car accident, fall, heart attack, stroke, whatever - can cause you to be hospitalized. During this pandemic, a lot of us have "cleaned and cleared" closets and storage. All of us have spares and more, so put some to good use.

Here is a list of some essentials you will be happy to have during that unexpected hospital experience. Pack them into a small tote or back pack with your name tag on same and have it handy in the front hall closet. Whoever takes you to the hospital, family, paramedic team or ambulance, can pick up that bag and it can go with you if you go from home. If not, the family or a friend will be happy to pick it up for you and bring it to the hospital.

OHIP number, also any other medical insurance number (Blue Cross etc); next of kin and their telephone numbers; list of medication, dosage and which doctor prescribed them;

housecoat and slippers;

toothbrush and tooth paste - if you have dentures, soaking container and cleaning tablets;

comb and brush and for the ladies - spray and mousse;

curling iron - you will be told not to use it but take it anyhow, you never know your luck;

make-up, cleanser and moisturizer;

nail file;

body lotion shampoo;

hearing aid batteries if you wear a hearing aid;

eye glass cleaner and lint free wiping cloth;

a couple of pair of cotton socks - feet get cold in hospitals;

soap and a scrubber - you may be able to have a shower;

shower cap;

deodorant;

book to read or crossword to use or some such amusement;

pen and paper and pencil - you will be glad you did;

hard candy and some mints;

shaving gear for the men, the whole kit and kaboodle;

a small box of Kleenex or other tissues.

AND

Cooking for one is not much fun, but maybe these tried and true ideas will help a bit.

Meatloaf? Go ahead and mix up your favourite meat loaf recipe - BUT- cook it in a muffin pan, eat what you want and freeze the rest in a freezer bag, ready for another time.

Quick breads are delicious but a whole loaf for one? Save four soup cans, wash & dry and line the bottom and the sides with parchment paper. Mix up your quick

bread recipe and divide and put the batter into the prepared tins. Bake at recipe suggested temperature but start testing a few minutes earlier. Be sure to "test" to the middle of the tin. The loaves should slide right out of the cans. Some to enjoy, some to share, some to freeze.

Tea biscuits? Again use those four tins and prepare but also cut out extra circles the size of the bottom of the cans. Pat or roll out your biscuit dough. Cut in circles, I use one of the cans to cut the biscuits, and place the unbaked biscuit in a

prepared tin, layer them into the tins, parchment paper, biscuit, parchment paper, biscuit etc. Cover tin with foil and freeze. When you want to bake a few tea biscuits, put frozen biscuits on a parchment lined baking sheet, and bake in preheated oven...add a few minutes to baking time.

Spaghetti? Make your favourite sauce and freeze it in an ice cube tray, then pop out a couple of cubes of sauce to thaw in your microwave oven while the spaghetti cooks. Easy!!




