It has been more than three years since you, the good people of New St James, and I, your troublesome Interim Moderator, were yoked together. Such a long journey!

I've worked alongside the Search Committee as it sought a new Minister and I've given guidance to the Session. When called upon, I've helped out with pastoral and administrative matters as they've arisen. I sought out Ministers who could serve New St James week by week in the pulpit and be a pastoral presence during the long `interregnum'.

Through it all, I've come to know a wide cast of characters. New St James is a wonderful congregation. It's blessed with committed staff and competent leadership. May I make mention, in that regard, of Bruce Curtis, the Clerk of Session? He is wise and proficient in all the right ways, and I've personally benefited from the privilege of knowing him and working alongside him.

The history of New St James is long and notable. There's every reason to believe its future will be too. Calling a new Presbyterian Minister may take longer than electing a new Pope, but for New St James the long and winding road that leads to the Induction of a New Minister will soon reach its destination. The Rev. Dr. David Clark preached for a Call to New St James on Sunday, September 27. The Call will be processed by the Presbytery of London. I'm quite sure they will approve the Call. We all wish this didn't have to happen in the middle of a pandemic, but we're intrepid and resourceful people, are we not? We can make this work, and we will be glad and grateful.

Dr. Clark is clever and kind. He brings a breadth of experience to New St James. Not only has he served capably as Minister of a Congregation, he has also served competently as a Chaplain in the Canadian Armed Forces, and as a parttime Lecturer at the University of Toronto while he was completing a splendid dissertation for a Ph.D. degree. Those who know him recognise his pastoral gifts and his good character.

We often mire ourselves in issues of 'fit' and 'match' when we think of Calling a Minister. Will this person 'fit us' like a hand in a glove, and 'match us' the way a piece slots into a puzzle? Those questions haven't been ignored. But down the centuries, through prayer and experience, the Church has discerned another 'agency' at work, one that knows more than we do.

It's the 'Hand of God's Providence'. I believe that, through our many months of waiting and working, Providence has been at work too.

From the Clerk of Session

While the past couple of weeks have been exceptionally busy for the Church, it has been for very good reason as we move ahead in our search and "Call" process. It was with great excitement that the Rev. Dr. David Clark "Preached for the Call" on Sunday, September 27, 2020 The Ruling Elders of the Session were in attendance to hear the service and significant effort was made to livestream, record (for later viewing) and broadcast the service by FM frequency for the Congregation to hear. By all reports received on the day and in subsequent days, Rev. Clark's service and sermon were well received as he preached an inspiring and uplifting sermon.

Later in the afternoon of September 27, a virtual online Congregational meeting was held for the Church to consider proceeding with the Call and extending an invitation for the Rev. David Clark to become our next Minister.

I am happy to report that the Congregation overwhelmingly voted in favour of Rev. David Clark Following from that meeting, the Elders of New St. James made phone calls to their District members to seek their support on the "Call Documents" which were compiled for presentation to the Presbytery of London with New St. James' request that the Presbytery approve and sustain the Call request Should the London Presbytery sustain the Call, the interim Moderator and Clerk of Session will appear before the Presbytery of Brampton to request that Rev. Clark be released and transferred to the London Presbytery.

The remainder of the work to accomplish the Call process will take several weeks to complete. Should we be successful in completing the Call by getting support from the Congregation and approval from the appropriate Presbyteries, we will be in a better position later in November to determine the timing for Rev. Clark to join us at New St. James.

The efforts of many people in preparing for and delivering the in-person Worship Service, and livestreaming, recording and broadcasting must be acknowledged. Thank you to Torin Chiles for his fine musical selections and our soloist Ariel Harwood-Jones, both of which augmented the worship service beautifully. Thank you to Torin, Nawton and Tennyson Chiles for all of their technical competence and abilities to livestream the service. A special thanks to Steve Harris for a truly wonderful recording of the service for our members to view. Thanks to Rob McGugan and Frank Walsh for being ushers and managing the Session in the Sanctuary and to Charlene Beynon for all of her work in coordinating the virtual online meetings. And finally, thank you to Rev. Clark for all of his preparations and being with us in worship and delivering his well-received service!

While we are not done yet, I would like to express my appreciation to our Interim Moderator, Rev. Dr. Andrew Fullerton, and the Search Committee (Charlene Beynon, Frank Walsh, Steve Harris, Rob McGugan, Tim Van Hees, Monica Sass, Susan McNair, Tom DeKay, Bruce Curtis) for their endurance, unfailing patience, support and cooperation throughout this search process. The Committee stayed on track in looking for a capable minister with the right combination of qualities and skills to become the Minister at New St. James. Their diligence and perception have helped choosing a fine candidate minister for our Church. Further, the insight and leadership provided by Rev. Fullerton have been invaluable throughout the process. Thank you to Rev. Fullerton and all of the Committee!

All of this activity related to the Call process has certainly occupied a great deal of time for the Session, Interim Moderator and Church Leadership. While we have not lost sight of the issue of COVID-19 and worship services, our focus of attention has been rightly directed toward the Call process. Once time permits, we will be reviewing the COVID situation in light of current circumstances with respect to worship. Ontario has recently moved into the second wave of COVID and any decision regarding a return to worship must take into account the extent of virus in the community, the risk of spreading the virus, and keeping both our staff and Congregation healthy and safe. Stay tuned and we will update you on these matters as things progress and we have information to share.

From the Music Director

I write this dispatch for our NSJ Newsletter sitting in my dining room on a Thursday evening. That sounds normal enough, but for me for the past 20 years, it has been anything but normal to be at home on a Thursday evening. Thursdays are affectionately known across this country as "Choir Night in Canada" since almost all churches hold their Choir rehearsals on Thursday evenings. Community Choirs and other singing endeavours all know NOT to schedule anything on Thursday nights since all the singers will be in church on Thursday evenings. Even opera companies traditionally have the Thursday night before a Friday evening opening night as the "dark" night before the run!

For the past 20 years (I was Music Director out at Strathroy United Church before coming to NSJ in 2004!) I have gone directly from my last lesson (5:30pm) at the Faculty of Music to the church where I scarf down a dinner (lovingly prepared and packed by Lesley), and prepare for the choir rehearsal that begins at 7:30. This often involves some photocopying, practicing the accompaniments, score study and then a little guiet time to focus my brain. I share this with you to give you some insight into why it feels so very odd for me to be sitting at my dining room table as Lesley prepares dinner on a THURSDAY evening. The rhythm of long years... is OFF! And I cannot begin to describe how I miss the fellowship and music-making with the choir members of NSJ.

The scriptures last Sunday that Rev. Dr. David Clark preached upon were about trusting God, even when spending time in a baren wilderness, and even in times of privation and loneliness. Those

readings and the words of David's thoughtful sermon spoke to me powerfully. They were a comfort, a solace, and an encouragement to persevere in faith, in community, with a clear mission and with love. I found myself thinking to myself on Sunday afternoon, "we can DO this", "we ARE making a difference", "things will get better and evolve as we learn"!

Sometimes a sermon can be a bit of a pep-talk and I think the readings of this past Sunday and the wise words of Rev. Dr. David Clark were heard by me at just the right time, and in just the right way, to sooth my unsettled feelings of being out of my normal rhythm and my deep sense of loss as we do without the NSJ Choir and indeed without our normal Sunday service. That loss of music, fellowship and spiritual connection is distressing to me, and I am sure that it is to others too, but we WILL make it through this wilderness. The desert shall rejoice and blossom as the rose and springs will break forth abundantly. Let me not be impatient, let me not put God to the test, let me not lose faith, let me seek to do good where and how I can.

My eyesight is not what it once was and sometimes I rest my eyes during the sermon. (Note from the Publisher: ?!?!?) A teasing chorister once asked me if I was catching forty winks! Not this past Sunday, thank God!



Mission and Social Action Committee

Despite the lack of face-to-face meetings, the Committee has kept in touch with e-mails and phone calls. Thus, donations to various agencies have been on-going.

We were not able to sponsor any children to attend Camp Kintail this summer because all overnight camping was halted. In the meantime, the Committee has sent a total of \$3,000 to the camp to help off-set the daily costs of maintaining the grounds and cabins.

With schools now in session, the Committee donated \$800 to the May Court Club of London to assist with its school nutrition program.

A new affordable housing initiative has come to the attention of the Committee. Information from a CBC commentary states: "**Indwell** is a Hamilton-based Christian organization which is turning the site of the old *Embassy Hotel* at 744 Dundas Street, London, into *Embassy Commons.* The 72-unit apartment building will be geared towards people struggling with addiction, mental health or finding a stable place to live."

Indwell's first London residence, *Woodfield Gate*, opened last year at 356 Dundas Street. Linda De Bruyn has lived at *Woodfield Gate* for about a year and says, "I want to tell people that Indwell does give people hope. I have had a wonderful transition living at Indwell. I have overcome a lot. There is a lot of support."

Members of the Mission and Social Action Committee will tour *Woodfield Gate* later this month.
