A Brief Biography

David Clark spent his childhood in both Ottawa and South America. While studying for his B.A. at McGill University, he came to Christian faith through the ministry of The Church of St. Andrew and St. Paul in Montreal, where he later served as Church School Teacher and Student Minister. In Montreal, he met his future wife, Meredith; they were married in 2006. He completed his M.Div. at the Presbyterian College, then was ordained by the Presbytery of Montreal in 2009.

He served as Minister of Calvin Presbyterian Church, North Bay, where he was also enrolled as a Chaplain in the Canadian Armed Forces.

While serving as Stated Supply at St. David's Presbyterian Church,

Campbellville, David pursued a Ph.D. degree in Theological Studies at the University of Toronto and the Toronto School of Theology (Wycliffe College). He completed this work after defending his dissertation, "Jewish Scriptures in Nazi Germany: Dietrich Bonhoeffer and the Old Testament, 1932-1945." During his doctoral work, he was appointed Adjunct Faculty at Wycliffe College (where he continues to teach theology) and also lectured in Jewish Studies at the University of Toronto.

David loves time with his family, which has grown to include three children (aged 9, 7, and 3) and a Standard Schnauzer. He is delighted to begin this new chapter as Minister of New St. James Presbyterian Church.

From the Minister

Emptied and Filled: Advent and Christmastide in a Pandemic

Dear friends in Christ,

To begin, I wish to express my appreciation for your recent kindnesses: despite the limitations of our current conditions, I have felt very warmly welcomed by the congregation. I am delighted, and grateful, to begin this ministry at New St. James. I look forward to celebrating and sharing in Christ's presence in the days and months to come.

As I reflect on Advent and Christmastide, I suspect that many may find themselves anticipating this season with dismay, looking toward the coming days with a sense of disappointment, loss, or loneliness. As we diligently follow guidelines needed to safeguard one another's health, we recognize that many joyous holiday traditions simply must be deferred: this will not be the year for singing carols together, gathering for Christmas festivities, or visiting friends and family. Instead, this Advent and Christmastide may bring unwanted isolation for many in the congregation.

I discussed these difficulties with an elder here at New St. James, who wisely suggested that—as we cancel activities that normally fill this season—we may perhaps discover new and meaningful opportunities to reflect on Christ. This conversation reminded me of a letter from Dietrich Bonhoeffer (a German pastor and theologian) to his fiancée, Maria von Wedemeyer. In December 1943, writing from a prison in Nazi Germany, Bonhoeffer offered this surprising message of hope:

> I think we're going to have an exceptionally good Christmas. The very fact that every outward circumstance precludes our making provision for it will show whether we can be content with what is truly essential. I used to be very fond of thinking up and buying presents, but now that we have nothing to give, the gift God gave us in the birth of Christ will seem all the more glorious [...]. So let us approach this Christmastide not only undaunted but with complete confidence.¹

I certainly would not suggest that our circumstances are comparable to Bonhoeffer's conditions during his

imprisonment; however, I think we can learn something profound and helpful from his hopeful perspective on a Christmas without outward celebration. In Bonhoeffer's view, the more Christmas was stripped of its festivities and shorn of its usual jollity, the more Christmas could centre on God's gift to us in Jesus Christ. That is, the more Advent and Christmastide are *emptied* of our accustomed celebrations, the more we may find Advent and Christmastide *filled* by the presence of Christ.

This year, as we are often alone or separated, perhaps we may find new opportunities to recognize that—because of Christ's presence—we are indeed never truly alone. May God give us grace to rejoice in Christ's presence with us throughout the coming season: even as we experience emptiness in our homes and calendars, let us take comfort in the promise that we may yet be filled by the presence of Christ, who is God's gift to us all.

From the Clerk of Session

As we head into the Season of Advent, we are reminded that it is a time of expectant waiting as we prepare for the celebration of the arrival of Christ on that first Christmas. Advent now gives us a time for quiet reflection after a very busy Autumn period of monitoring the developments related to COVID and completing our Search Process with the Preaching for the Call, seeking approvals for our new Minister and preparing for the Induction Service. As you read in this Newsletter about the many things which have happened, we can celebrate the achievement of those things and then return our minds to the true purpose of the Season.

On the issue of the Coronavirus, the COVID-19 Response Team has been vigilant in monitoring the situation and observing the successes and challenges of other Churches and other locations across the Province. With the second wave and the rampant spread of the virus across the Province and the Country, it was the right decision to continue our suspension of in-person worship. A number of local churches which had returned to in-person worship have since re-suspended public worship and will not be re-considering this matter until late Winter or early Spring. We will continue to monitor the COVID situation, consider the advice of the health authorities, and wait until it is the safest and wisest time to resume public worship.

As we come toward the year-end it is always an important time to check-in on our Church finances and how we will meet our budgetary obligations. While we have not been meeting in-person for Worship, we still have expenses which must be covered, and we thank those who have continued with their generous offerings. The Board of Managers will be providing more information to you in this regard and we ask you to consider that information and respond as you are able. Further, with respect to 2021 Offering Envelopes, Elders are reminded to pick up their District envelopes and Pastoral Care Baskets on December 5, 2020, between 9:30 and 11:30 a.m. at the Church, for delivery to members within your District.

Lastly, this is a reminder to all of those folks who have a report to prepare for

the 2020 Annual Report. We will be working on determining when and how we will hold an Annual Meeting in 2021, but we will need your reports to be delivered to Judi LeBlanc in the Church Office by mid-January. Judi will be notifying you of this date soon.

Rev. Clark, as our new Minister, will ensure that meaningful and engaging worship opportunities are provided each Sunday morning. He is working on ways to help the members of New St. James be more fully engaged and participating in Worship from their own homes. As part of that effort, Rev. Clark will provide an Order of Service which will be posted on the Church Website each week for everyone to follow and it will include various elements (e.g., Psalms and Prayers) which can be said in unison by both those at the Church and those at home.

In keeping with our tradition of lighting the Advent Candles and reading the PWS&D Liturgies, we will be posting the Advent Liturgy each week with the Order of Service so that everyone at home can participate and if they like, light their own Advent Wreath Candles at home. We look forward to sharing this time of Worship together through Advent and into the Christmas Season.
