Reflecting on a Psalm in Unison, Together and Apart: An Invitation to Prepare for Lent

Greetings in Christ:

I am grateful for the shared efforts that make possible the livestreamed worship each Sunday at New St. James. This ministry of worship can continue amid the pandemic thanks to the contributions of the excellent Director of Music (Torin Chiles), his dedicated sons (Nawton and Tennyson), the exceptional soloist (Ariel Harwood-Jones), and several others serving faithfully "behind the scenes."

Yet one aspect of worship that cannot currently continue is the joining together of voices in the spoken liturgy: until it is safe to do so, we cannot offer readings and prayers responsively, antiphonally (alternating by group), or in unison. Nonetheless, to enable worshippers at home to join their voices together, I include the Call to Worship in Unison and the Psalm in Unison. This way, households worshipping together can still join their voices; likewise, those living alone can offer these elements of worship aloud, knowing that friends in other places are also lifting their voices at the same time.

The First Sunday in Lent, on February 21, is now only a few weeks away. In order to prepare for Lent, I invite you to share in a simple devotional exercise that focuses on our Psalm in Unison for that Sunday. From February 1-20 (the twenty days leading up to the First Sunday in

Lent), I encourage you to take a bit of time—each morning and again each evening—to pray one verse from Psalm 25:1-10. Here's a simple schedule:

February 1 & 2 \rightarrow Psalm 25:1 February 3 & 4 \rightarrow Psalm 25:2 February 5 & 6 \rightarrow Psalm 25:3 February 7 & 8 \rightarrow Psalm 25:4 February 9 & 10 \rightarrow Psalm 25:5 February 11 & 12 \rightarrow Psalm 25:6 February 13 & 14 \rightarrow Psalm 25:7 February 15 & 16 \rightarrow Psalm 25:8 February 17 & 18 \rightarrow Psalm 25:9 February 19 & 20 \rightarrow Psalm 25:10

Each verse is designated for two days, affording ample time to reflect on its meaning and place in your life of faith. Try reflecting on the designated verse first in the morning (as your day begins), then again in the evening (as your day ends): by bookending each day with the same verse, you may find that you often remember the verse as you go about your daily tasks.

By February 21, the First Sunday in Lent, you will have dedicated many prayerful moments to reflecting—verse by verse—on the Psalm in Unison. That Sunday, when you offer aloud the Psalm in Unison from home, you will share in a Scriptural prayer that we will have explored together and apart. I'll be interested to hear what you notice or discover as you reflect on Psalm 25: feel free to let me know!

COVID Response

The situation with the COVID virus continues to evolve and as the Congregation is aware, the Provincial Government has issued new restrictions to reduce the spread of the virus. Accordingly, the COVID Response Team has met several times recently to adapt and enhance the COVID-related procedures of New St. James. New St. James continues to take a precautionary approach which always meets or exceeds Provincial requirements.

Effective January 14, physical attendance at the Church building will be for essential purposes only.

The Minister and Staff will be in the Church building on a limited basis only, ensuring essential on-site work is completed and that the building is secure.

If you have an important reason to enter the Church building, please contact the Church Office Administrator by phone or email well in advance.

Worship services will be conducted in accordance with the new requirements including masking for ALL individuals involved.

Masking is required for all indoor activities, including Worship Services.

Further, the Church is also a workplace under legislation, and we must ensure
