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From the Minister

Greetings in Christ:

As we mark one year since the pandemic was declared, we have much to remember before God: even as we lament widespread hardship and loss of life, we may also give thanks for the many people we have depended on daily. Amid our concerns at this time, I wish to reflect briefly on the practice of patience amid the pandemic.

Looking back, I notice how the pandemic has constantly required patience. In March 2020, as abrupt closures caused disruptions, it became evident that these conditions would demand continual patience. In the year that followed—amid delays, long lines, postponements, and cancellations—we have needed to be patient with one another, recognizing always that others are experiencing their own challenges.

However, even as our circumstances have made clear the importance of patience, it seems the pandemic has also exposed a pervasive lack of patience. Examples of impatience remain common; it is particularly disappointing that people working in the retail and service industries face impatient hostility for inconveniences outside their control.

As a Christian community, how might we become more patient with others? To start, we may gratefully affirm that God is patient with us. The Swiss theologian Karl Barth emphasized that God's patience is fundamental to God's life and being: God's "love bears essentially the

character of patience," he wrote. Indeed, according to Barth, patience is so central to God's identity that "everything that God is, is implied and included in the statement that He is patient." Barth describes God's patience, moreover, as God's "will [...] to allow to another [...] space and time for the development of its own existence." Put simply, God's patience is that God permits us time and space to grow and change. (See A. J. Johnston, God's Being in Reconciliation, 127-128.)

Since God is patient with us, could we then—out of gratitude—offer more patience to others? It may be helpful to consider the practice of patience in parallel with social distancing. In public settings, we diligently allow others the space they need to pass by us safely; in this way, we have learned to avoid impinging on someone else's needed space.

Similarly, patience is how we avoid impinging on someone else's needed time. That is, patience is how we grant others the time they need to rest and recover, to pause and breathe, to reflect and reconsider. Patience is thus a gift that we may give to others, in order to help them grow and flourish. These days especially, amid much impatience, our patience with others may bring them blessing and encouragement.

In our interactions with others, could we reflect the patience that God has shown us? As God in Christ remains patient with us, may we also offer patience to others.

From the Session

Greetings from Session and our best wishes for a very happy and joyous Easter Season! Despite the ongoing pandemic, New St. James remains strong and continues to celebrate the love of Christ through our ongoing Worship Services which are streamed live from our Sanctuary on Sunday mornings. Also, the Session of New St. James continues to meet virtually through Zoom to conduct the business of the Church and met recently on March 16, 2021. This article provides some updates from that meeting.

First of all, a big thank you to everyone who contributed to the success of our first virtual Annual Congregational Meeting. We appreciate the work of our Office Administrator, Judi Le Blanc, and everyone else who contributed to the production of the 2020 Annual Report. Also, thanks to Charlene Beynon for managing the Zoom meeting and invitations, Steve Harris for overseeing the work of the Board of Managers, Jeff Goud for all of his work in managing the financial affairs of the Church, Lesley Harris for her thoughtful and well-spoken words of appreciation, and to Rev. David Clark for adeptly chairing his first Annual Meeting with us.

Session approved a number of items at its March Meeting, including holding Communion services by electronic means, via videoconference, on the appointed dates set by Session, while the continuing COVID restrictions remain in place. In this regard, a Maundy Thursday Evening Communion Service will be held by Zoom video conference at 7:00 p.m. on Thursday, April 1, (see more details in the notice included in this Newsletter). Also, a Good Friday Worship Service will be held at 10:30 a.m. on Friday, April 2,

streamed live from the Sanctuary.

It has now been one year since Torin Chiles started us on the road to live streaming our Sunday morning Worship Services. During the pandemic this has allowed us to connect with the Congregation and bring regular Sunday morning worship to our members and a broader community. We appreciate the work of Torin, and his sons, Nawton and Tennyson, often using their own equipment (e.g., camera, microphone and computer) to make this happen. Given that the ongoing pandemic will be with us for some time yet and the likelihood that there may need to be a future period of transition to full capacity in-person worship services, Session has taken action to properly resource the live streaming activity. In that regard, Session approved the establishment of "Live Streaming Working Team" (comprised of Rev. David Clark, Torin Chiles, Steve Harris, and Bruce Curtis) to determine equipment needs, obtain price quotations, investigate funding sources, and arrange for the acquisition, installation and implementation of such equipment, in consultation with the appropriate groups and persons as necessary.

Finally, as the pandemic continues, the COVID Response Team also continues to monitor the situation and appropriate governmental and health directions. After the recent lockdown, Church staff have returned to work on site but the building remains closed except for essential work and necessary maintenance. If there is a reason for you to attend at the Church, you must make an appointment through Judi LeBlanc, sign-in to the building, and be masked at all times.

From the Organ Console

Here we are, a year after an unimaginable but entirely necessary shift away from our normal face-to-face worship together in our beautiful sanctuary, and a year into the brave new world of gathering together online as a community of faith, to continue the acts of worship and mission that folks have doing at NSJ for over 185 years now. That shift has been in a constant state of evolution since March 15, 2020.

That first "broadcast" on March 15, 2020, consisted of me coming to church early on the Sunday morning as I am accustomed to doing, propping up my iPad in one corner of the organ console and merely playing and singing a few hymns as a way of maintaining some normalcy and bringing comfort and solace through a very strange time as we tried to understand our situation and what we were up against on that first Sunday of

the Pandemic lockdown. The format of those live-streams evolved through the lockdown as we moved to a live-stream from the Chiles living room and then, by the summer, back into the sanctuary and finally with the arrival of Rev. Dr. David Clark, into the current full "Virtual Service" with wonderful sermons, prayers, Ariel Harwood-Jones providing the singing and my son, Nawton, presenting the readings. Our Sunday morning bubble is still very small! Even as this format gives comfort through its familiar form, the technical aspects continue to evolve behind the scenes.

My younger son Tennyson has become quite adept at operating the camera and processing the final recording for publishing on Facebook and now YouTube. We have undergone many evolutions and upgrades to the technical equipment we have been using and we

anticipate a big upgrade coming soon that will allow for a high-definition video camera with a zoom lens which will let us to bring even more of the beauty of our sanctuary into your homes on Sunday mornings.

We have been streaming live to Facebook and we started on my personal FB page that Sunday a year ago. We have since migrated the live stream to the New St. James Facebook page, with a mirroring "share" to my Facebook page. Our next big evolution will be to migrate the livestream to the YouTube platform. This will allow us to stream in higher definition video and more easily embed the recording after the livestream in out Website homepage. This shift will happen very soon and will mean that those of you used to watching on Facebook will now receive a notification that I or the NSJ Facebook page are "watching" a YouTube live stream. The notification will include a link for you to follow to be taken to the live-stream feed on YouTube. We think that we will also be able to include a link for the YouTube livestream on our church website homepage too.

The outreach of these services has surprised us! We regularly read comments from around the world, and people tell us how these services have been important to them throughout this pandemic. It reminds us that surprising, good things can emerge from adversity. It reminds us that the internet is a powerful tool for outreach and that the more we all "comment", "like", "subscribe" and "share", the more people these live-streams can reach. It's not the same as our real, face to face worship; it

will never replace our normal gathering on Sunday mornings. But it's the best we can do under the circumstance, and we are continuing to reach people within our congregation and well beyond each Sunday morning.

Each evolutionary change in our virtual services, each step, takes time to organize, test very carefully, and then consolidate into the new normal of our Sunday morning broadcasts. I continue to be very grateful for the dedication and technical skills of my two sons, Nawton and Tennyson, as we keep these streaming services coming, Sunday by Sunday, and keep them evolving and improving. The Worship Committee continues to oversee these services and continues to offer support, encouragement and guidance as we navigate public health recommendations and respond creatively to the reality of worshiping as a community of faith in the time of COVID-19.

Finally, we are grateful for the feedback we get - sometimes even mid-service! This feedback helps us improve, and your suggestions are all considered very carefully as we work to try to improve the form, content and medium of our worship time together week by week. We look forward to this continued evolution, and hope that as public health recommendations change our service can evolve to include more people in the sanctuary on Sunday mornings, more reliable and better-quality technical equipment, and a more meaningful worship experience for all in our church family.

Queen's Commonwealth Essay Competition

I have served as a volunteer judge for the Queen's Commonwealth Essay Competition for several years. Every year hundreds of Canadian students enter this important competition along with thousands from other Commonwealth nations. In the last several years, a number of Canadian students have taken top prizes. The Queen's Commonwealth Essay Competition is the world's oldest writing contest for young people. There are two age categories. The junior division is open to those who are born on or after July 1, 2007. The senior category belongs to those who have been born between July 1, 2002 and June 30, 2007 (14-18 years of age).

The realities of COVID 19 have been felt around the world and throughout the Commonwealth. We have felt them in our congregations. The theme for this year's

essay competition is "Community in the Commonwealth." Young people are being urged to reflect upon the ways that local and global communities have come together during the pandemic to offer hope and security. Participants in each category are given four topics from which to choose. This is not a research essay. Poetry, fiction, and creative reflection are welcome.

Please encourage any young people you know to participate. Awards will be presented in the autumn by the Patron of the competition, HRH the Duchess of Cornwall. In the past winners have been flown to London, England for a week of events including the awards ceremony at Buckingham Palace. All students will receive a participation certificate. Some entrants will be awarded a bronze, silver, gold, or top gold certificate.

Submissions to the competition may be made between May 1, 2021 and June 30, 2021. Please visit the Royal

And kids, don't forget to invite your siblings, parents and grandparents along. It's for the whole family.


So, on Palm Sunday go to the New St. James website and click on HOLY WEEK. That's it....click and discover!
