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#### From the Minister

In September, as the new academic year begins, it's important to remember the vital and challenging work of theological education. At General Assembly this past June, I was appointed to the Board of Governors of the Presbyterian College in Montreal (one of the three seminaries of the Presbyterian Church in Canada). For this issue of the newsletter, the Principal of the Presbyterian College, The Rev. Dr. Roland De Vries, kindly agreed to be interviewed; in what follows, he offers us valuable perspectives regarding theological education and the work of the College.

Dr. Clark: Could you share with New St. James a bit about the mission and purpose of the Presbyterian College?

Dr. De Vries: The Presbyterian College was established in 1865—as we like to say, two years before Canada was born! Since then, our primary mission has been the formation of pastoral leaders. But our ministry also extends now to the forming of lay leaders, and to equipping congregations to live their faith in the everyday. Though the times have changed, we have always been a college centered on Jesus and equipping Christians to live in the good news he is for our world.

Dr. Clark: What's a recent development at the College that furthers this mission?

Dr. De Vries: In 2015 the College established a Leadership Centre, and we are presently searching for a full-time Director of Programs, to begin in Fall 2022. The Centre will continue to support a mentoring program for pastors. We will also develop new programs to support reflection on Faith and Work and to equip congregations for their own local mission.

We are also very excited about a new partnership that has allowed us to establish a Master of Theological Studies program, in French. This program now has 17 students enrolled and is designed to support their missional engagement in their Francophone context.

Dr. Clark: In addition to training future ministers, the Presbyterian College offers other learning opportunities. Could you tell us about this?

Dr. De Vries: In 2021 we established a new program of online studies, which are available to individuals and congregational study groups across the country (or the world, for that matter). These studies are usually six weeks in length and include an hour of teaching and then discussion time. For those who are involved with congregational study groups, those groups gather in their own Zoom break-out rooms for conversation. This Fall we will offer two studies: Disability and the Church, and Praying in Public Worship.

Dr. Clark: From your perspective as Principal, what are some challenges that theological students are facing today? How can the Presbyterian Church support our theological students?

Dr. De Vries: There are a number of challenges that theological students face. I think one of the greatest challenges, particularly those training for pastoral ministry, is the overwhelming number of questions or issues they anticipate in ministry—challenges that pastors themselves already face. These relate to mission, racism, doubt, reconciliation, post-pandemic participation in the church, and more. Though these questions can be daunting, please pray

that our students will be able to keep their attention focused on the One who is our life and foundation in the face of all such questions. That they would remain centered on their call to proclaim and live confidently with Jesus Christ, our Lord.

#### From the Clerk of Session

As the Summer days become shorter, we know that the Autumn will soon be approaching and that gives us reason to enjoy each and every warm Summer day we have been given and also to enjoy the bounty of the season. Also, please remember that we will resume our 10:30 a.m. start of Worship beginning on September 11. Session has not met during the Summer, but there are a few things we can update for you.

Summer worship has continued both inperson and on livestream. Our attendance on Sunday mornings has been averaging between 50 and 60 individuals and those unable to make it out in person have been watching on our YouTube channel. We thank our Worship Team of Rev. Dr. Clark, Torin Chiles on organ and piano, Soloist Ariel Harwood-Jones, and Nawton Chiles manning the camera and technology to provide the livestream. We also thank those dependable individuals who have volunteered to be greeters and ushers on Sunday mornings and those who have provided for refreshments after worship. It has been a very positive experience to eniov lemonade and fellowship through these warm months. We are still in need of volunteers to help with the Welcome Ministry by being greeters and ushers. After an extended period without our much-valued New St. James Choir, we are now looking toward the Choir's return in September. Working to develop appropriate pandemic precautions and

safeguards, Torin Chiles has begun to prepare for the Choir's return with protocols to ensure the health and safety of both the Choir and the Congregation. We look forward to hearing the Choir again and enjoying the way in which they enhance our experience of worship.

We are also working toward holding a Communion Worship Service for World Communion Sunday on October 2. Of course, this is dependent on the state of the pandemic at that time. There are a number of logistics and preparations which must be worked out for this Communion Service, so please stay tuned to the Sunday announcements for further information in this regard.

As noted in the April 2022 Newsletter, groups are permitted to meet at the Church using large space rooms to allow for distance separation and these are to be booked through the Church Office. Masking is still required for those ministries of New St. James, and vaccinations are recommended. This situation will be monitored as the pandemic progresses in order to ensure the health and safety of our Church Congregation and Staff. Also, some outside uses may be returning after Labour Day and these will be managed by the Board of Managers.

On a happy note, I would like to relay a story of celebration and success for the Strang Presbyterian Church in Dixonville, Alberta. Strang Presbyterian Church celebrated their 90th Anniversary on August 22, 2022. Many of our Congregation will be aware that 90 years ago New St. James supported and sponsored Dr. Margaret Strang to travel to Northern Alberta to work on the mission of establishing a new Church in the region. Dr. Strang's work was a success, and the Church was established and is still in existence today. Many will remember 15 years ago when Mary Lou and Ian McCrimmon travelled to Dixonville to help them celebrate their 75th Anniversary. Mary Lou has remarked that Strang Presbyterian Church holds New St. James in great reverence for their support and

sponsorship those many years ago. That support included purchasing and shipping a pulpit to the Church for use in their Sanctuary. The greetings and best wishes of New St. James were extended to Strang Church, through our Clerk of Session and Minister, for their 90th Anniversary celebratory worship and events as we continue to cherish the long relationship between our two Churches.

Best wishes for the remainder of the Summer and we look forward to seeing many of you at worship on Sunday mornings.

**Treasurer's Report:** Lu Brule reported on the funds of Presbytery, with a reminder that Presbytery has funds to which congregations can apply for innovative projects, a fund to help students for the ministry, and a lending fund for churches who are completing

capital projects and need financial assistance.

The Synod of SouthWestern Ontario (the court of the church that oversees Presbytery) meets once a year in October. This year, synod will be meeting via Zoom.

**Rev. Jane Swatridge** has completed her work as interim minister at St. Lawrence Church, London.

#### **General Assembly Commissioners:**

Every year, clergy and ruling elders from all of the Presbyteries across the country attend our yearly national gathering, General Assembly. Our commissioners reported on highlights of this multi day meeting over Zoom. It was noted that this was the first year that an openly gay individual served as Moderator of the highest court of our denomination. Rev. Dr. Bob Faris was commended for his leadership.

The Life and Mission Agency produced a very helpful report, available on the national church website). Churches are encouraged to access the resources this agency offers for small churches.

**The Ministry Team** recommended that Sonia Brule be certified for ordination, the final step for a student discerning a call to ministry.

The Congregation Team is hoping to complete several regular visits to congregations in the fall, and is working to encourage churches that have not completed a Leading with Care policy to do so.

The Refugee Committee Report: The committee is waiting for a family in Lebanon to be interviewed. There is also

a second family, father and son, from Eritrea. This family is being privately funded by an individual but is supported by Presbytery. The third family is a Ukrainian family of five who require air fare to get to Canada. This family has accommodation arranged with relations in southern Ontario. Presbytery approved that this family's airfare be covered through the refugee committee.

Can you help? There are more Ukrainian families and individuals who are requiring assistance. Cheques can be made out to the Presbytery of London, with "Ukraine Refugees" in the memo section. Cheques may be sent to the treasurer of Presbytery.
